


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## "CHESHIRE"

Sometimes I just like to draw, sketch, or engrave whatever is in my thoughts, not thinking too much on what it is or why it came to mind.


One thing about engravings of this sort, there is no undo, there is no erase - anything you do is there and irreversible. It makes it exciting and fun for me.






A tarot card design I did for Bethalynne, whose card is "the Empress" in the standard deck. The original 5x7 inch engraving hangs on her wall.


One of my very earliest engraving pieces, back when I was actually using the scratching tool and before I moved up to my own hand-made tools for this.

"ALLIE AND THE MACHINE"

I wrote this children's book years ago. What remains to do is to illustrate about 40 pages- about 120 days of work that I would like to do straight through from beginning to end. My very next big project, is going to be to finally complete this thing.

I meant to keep all drawings secret until then, but it made for the perfect graphic for our Kickstarter promotions for The Infernal Device, and in that became an icon for this project.



### "THE PATH"

Engraved 5x7 inches (about this size) on Ampersand Art Clayboard (a tempered hardboard coated in white clay and India ink).

I wanted to make sure that there were nine figures, and nine torches, but I also wanted the tree to be torchlit - so there is a little trick of the eye done so I could maintain those numbers. There are a lot of hidden figures and images in this piece, all in a very tiny space.




### "Ooga Booga! (Blood and Sand)"


Though I love the weather, and being overwhelmed with things to do and see: I decided it was not for me... not right now anyway.



### "THE SABICU"

Engraved 5x7 inches (about this size) on Ampersand Art Clayboard (a tempered hardboard coated in white clay and India ink), I later decided to make this one into an oil painting by the same name.

The lovely thing about these engravings, is it is a portable way for me to work on bigger things. I go very deep in detail, looking at the 5x7 piece for how it will be printed at much larger sizes... which is actually necessary for anyone to be able to see all the detail at anything but point blank range. So, in a sense, it is a way for me to have a 16x20 work of art in my lap on a plane, without inconveniencing those sitting next to me.



### "20,000 LEAGUES UNDER"

When I was a child, I had a beautifully illustrated book of submarines and other underwater craft.

It contained things real, and things speculative - drawings made by artists centuries before the first submarines, photographs and drawings of amazing underwater craft that truly existed... some fashioned of wood and brass - shaped like turtles or wooden spheres.

I was instantly captivated by these, and the concept of underwater explorationin addition to my other dreams of being an explorer.

As time went on, the World became ever smaller - Every island, every forest, every cave explored meant one less place for fascinating monsters, wonderful new creatures, or strange tribes to exist. # A DIFFERENT SORT OF COLORING BOOK

Many centuries ago, I noticed that my friend Brian's copy of the AD&D<sup>™</sup> monster manual, unlike mine, was in full color - and though I loved the black and white illustrations in mine, his really had a lot of something special going on.

I found that he had colored his with color pencils, and was amazed at how simply, how easily all of the illustrations colored - With little effort, any illustration could become a very professional looking full -color work of art.

I set this memory aside, for a while, until at a convention I spotted members of Dr. Steel's<sup>™</sup> street team: The Toy Soldiers, passing out coloring books made of his iconic propaganda-inspired artworks - and made plans to make this book... eventually.

After weeks of our Kickstarter<sup>™</sup> fundraiser for the Infernal Device, it became evident that we needed something low-cost and high value to offer as a reward - and this book is one of many new rewards I came up with (thank you everyone who made that project successful)

### **COLORING RECOMMENDATIONS**

I recommend that you place a sheet of paper between already-colored pages when coloring. It really depends on what sort of coloring pencils you are using, and I won't endorse any particular brands, but some colored pencils can transfer to the facing page when rubbed from their back sides.
